

L890/QE890 Wonky Pillow

<u>Please note: This class is specifically for the Bernina L890 or QE890 sergers. If you don't own one of these models, this class won't be suitable. Be sure to bring your own 890 serger, as there are no machines available for loan at the store.</u>

Get ready to unleash your creativity in our exciting Wonky Pillow class with the 890 Bernina Serger! This fun and hands-on workshop is perfect for all skill levels, guiding you through threading, sewing and then cleaning your machine. With personalized instruction and plenty of time for questions, you'll leave with a custom made Pillow to showcase your new skills!

Supply list:

Fabric

For one pillow: (2) WOF 2 ¾ inches (Front of the bow) (Join these two strips)

- I used my scraps to make this pillow.
 - o You will need one feature design to place in the middle of your pillow.
 - This should be approximately 10 11 inches as we will be cutting it down in class prep time.
 - o You will need fabric scraps from about 10 or 11 coordinating colors.
 - Cut these straps into 1 ½, 2, 3 ½, and 4-inch strips. It will save time when you are here. Remember it is wonky, so the strips don't need to make sense. Just have fun with them.
- 2 or 3 10-inch square scrap fabric to use for checking our stitches before working on our project.

Thread

- 4-Thread Overlock #1 stitch and 3-Thread Flatlock Wide #5 stitch
 - o I used 2 cones the color that I would see on the outside of my pillow (light pink) color Mettler Seracor 100% Polyester
 - I also used 2 cones of a cream color as you would not see them and it is more cost friendly. – Mettler Silk-Finished Cotton 100% cotton
 - Note: Polyester thread is more durable than cotton I just used what I had on hand.
 - Note: You could use all cream color cones when stitching out the 4-thread Overlock stitch. I just chose not to rethread.

Needle: Schmetz Overlock Serger 80/20

Foot: C11

Machine: This class is only for the L890 and/or the QE890 Please bring all supplies needed to run your machine. Making sure you have all items in the door of the machine as well.

Pillow insert: I used a 16-inch pillow insert as that is what I had here at home. You can make it any size you would prefer.

Other:

Thread snips Tweezers

small and large ruler rotary cutter (with a new blade)
clips Sewline AIR erasing or Friction Pen

seam ripperFray check or Fray BlockYour machine manualHookey Serger Seam Hook

Paper for taking notes
